INTERESTED IN LEARNING BASIC MATTING AND FRAMING TECHNIQUES?

In the spring of 2004, your Exhibitions Committee held a workshop for SVNP members to teach the basics of mat-cutting, mounting, and framing. The session was quite well received, and several members have expressed interest in attending if we were to do another one. If there is sufficient interest, we would be willing to offer another session sometime in the spring of 2006, probably in the Raytheon Room at the Wayland Library and most likely on a Saturday morning. There would be a nominal charge (\$15-20) to cover the cost of materials.

The workshop would consist of about 30 minutes of tutorial, followed by demonstrations and some "hands on" time led by several SVNP members who have extensive matting and framing experience. Each attendee should plan on bringing one 8x10 or 8x12 print, which they will mat and frame during the workshop under the guidance of our "experts." We would have at least two mat cutters available. Handouts of presentation materials and other supplementary information (e.g., supplier lists) would be provided.

ANNOUNCING A SPECIAL SVNP WEBSITE EXHIBIT

"Out of the Box"

Your Exhibitions Committee is pleased to invite submissions for an upcoming special exhibit on the SVNP group website. In recognition of SVNP's tenth anniversary, and the inspiration and guidance of our co-founder, Budd Titlow, we have decided to create an exhibit with a theme that is based on Budd's article in the October issue of *Outdoor Photographer*. Budd titled his article "Breaking Away" (which is also the title of his October 22 presentation at the Goodnow Library in Sudbury).

His article, and hence the theme of this special exhibit, emphasizes the use of creative techniques, breaking the rules, and experimenting to produce exceptional photographs that traditionalists might consider unusual, unconventional, or "out of the box."

So, we invite SVNP members to submit <u>one or two</u> images that fit this theme. Some examples:

- Unusual or dramatic lighting
- Selective focus/creative use of depth-of-field
- Unusual or dramatic angles
- Creative use of motion, blur, etc.
- Abstracts
- Unusual patterns
- Rarely seen wildlife behavior
- Multiple exposures

Use your imagination and let the creative juices flow! Electronic submissions are strongly preferred, in the following format:

JPEG files, maximum size 125KB each No more than 640 pixels on the longest dimension 72 dpi resolution

Send the files (as e-mail attachments) to Wayne Hall, SVNP webmaster, at wah@waynehallphotography.com. Include the following information with each image:

- Your name as you want it to appear on the website (mandatory)
- E-mail address and phone number (mandatory, but will not appear on the site)
- Title (mandatory)
- Technical info (optional): camera, lens, film (if appropriate), filter(s)
- Brief description of any heavy-duty Photoshop® (or other tool) manipulation beyond normal cropping, color, and brightness/contrast correction, etc.

Technical Presentation

This evening our digital members exposed the group to a number of technical digital methods to enhance and/or create a new digital image. These were all extraordinary member images, mostly manipulated from the original with a Photoshop type program. This gave us a chance to use the newly purchased digital projector. This experiment allowed showing digital images as our first "program of the evening." In the future we plan to show these specialized images with our projector toward the end of the evening.

Photography Presentation: "Antarctica" was given by Amitava Gangulee

The Antarctic continent is wrapped around the South Pole, and the closest approach is from the port of Ushuaia (in Argentina) across the Drake Passage to the Antarctic peninsula. This trip in February 2005 was arranged first from the web and then through a local travel agent. It was an eight-day trip from Ushuaia on board the Norwegian ship *Marco Polo*, originally built to ply the Siberian Arctic Ocean.

After crossing Drake Passage, the first point of interest was a cruise into the volcanic caldera of Deception Island, where secondary craters are still active. The next stop was the penguin and fur-seal colonies at Cuverville Island, but the attempted landing was thwarted by driving snow. Next, *Marco Polo* tried to go through the wonderfully scenic Le Maire Channel but was stopped by accumulating icebergs. So, the ship headed for the Gentoo Penguin colonies at an old whaling station on Wiencke Island (near Port Lockroy), where a landing was possible for a close look at the penguin colonies.

From Wiencke Island, the ship sailed to the Waterboat point near Paradise Harbor on the Antarctic continent (Graham Land), where at low water, it is possible to trudge to the mainland glaciers through colonies of penguins. From Paradise Harbor, the ship sailed to Halfmoon Island with its colonies of Chinstrap Penguins and Antarctic Fur Seals

(actually sea-lions); landing in knee-deep ice-cold water was fun! From Halfmoon Island, it was across the Drake Passage again to the barren rocks of Cape Horn, and on to Ushuaia via the Beagle Channel.

The Antarctic peninsula is a nature photographer's dream land with its mountains, glaciers, and icebergs, along with 60+ species of birds (including 5 species of penguins), at least four species of whales, and six species of seals and sea-lions. The temperature in February (late summer) is only around 20-30°F but with 30-60 mph winds. The weather is unpredictable and rapidly changing on board a ship and seasickness a major concern.
